Elderly people in dire need of healthcare support are often abandoned by their families: Dr. G.P.Bhagat, SHEOWS

Care and concern for the elderly is a global crisis. By 2050, there will be twice as many seniors (65 and older) as there are children under the age of five. The scenario in India is alarming, and we continue to be in a quandary. Despite significant growth in old-age care homes and tech-savvy solutions, we are still off track. Geriatrics and palliative care are on the backseat, general physicians are scarce, and policies are scant. Worse is the plight of those who have been abandoned by their own family members. It's time for everyone to rethink!



Shahid Akhter, editor,
ETHealthworld, spoke to
Dr. G. P. Bhagat, founder
and general secretary of
SHEOWS, to figure out the
multiple challenges faced by
the elderly today. Policies
are not enough, facilities are

scarce, resources are inadequate, and the graph is on the rise. There is a massive increase in the number of <u>elderly people</u> being abandoned by their own families.

Elderly care: Challenges

The problem of the elderly is not new; it is a global issue, and in India, there are specific challenges for the elderly who are physically and mentally disabled. The first thing is the growing elderly population. It is estimated that by the year 2050, the elderly population will reach 21 billion, making it very challenging to care for them. The second thing is the prevalence of diseases among the elderly. Many of them suffer from mental and physical ailments such as dementia, Alzheimer's, psychiatric disorders, paralysis, and fractures.

Another big problem is the abandoning of the elderly, which started in 2000 in India. I have surveyed in Delhi NCR and found many people near temples and public places who were abandoned by their own families. This issue has increased significantly, with reports in the newspaper every day of someone abandoning their parents. This problem is growing day by day and poses a big challenge for the country.



Elderly care policies not enough

Not only in geriatrics but also in paramedical and caregivers, these staff are not available as needed. In India, the government introduced the Senior Citizen Act 2007 for the maintenance and welfare of senior citizens. However, the major problem that was not addressed in the policies is the elderly, who are physically and mentally disabled.

SHEOWS: Idea and origin

I submitted my M.Phil. dissertation in 1984. I conducted research on medical diagnosis through AI techniques and how artificial intelligence can assist physicians in diagnosing specific diseases. I found that there were no organisations in the Delhi NCR area dedicated to caring for physically and mentally disabled elderly individuals.

After conducting a survey, I found that there were no existing old-age homes in the area. This led me to establish one in the Gautampuri slum area of Delhi in 2003. Since then, the organisation has grown into a large institution. Currently, we operate three old-age homes, two in Delhi and one in <u>Garhmukteshwar</u>, which we proudly claim is the largest and most beautiful among them.

SHEOWS: Growth and expansion

We have a complete model of service. What is required of a physically and mentally disabled old person once they have been abandoned by their own family? They need complete behavioural love and affection, and medically, they need proper treatment. In each centre, we have full medical facilities like our own pathology lab, x-ray, physiotherapy centre, and a special care unit with full ICU facilities. Currently, we have around 25 physicians, paramedical staff, and technicians in our old-age home. For the last 20 years, we have been rescuing people. Our vehicle goes on the streets of Delhi, NCR, to bring the elderly to our facility, where we treat them and provide a better life in a beautiful and healthy environment.

SHEOWS: Future plans

As of now, we have three centres, but with our expansion in Gurgaon, we are going to start a geriatric research centre along with an old age home. Our research is focused on preventing and treating dementia through alternative medicine.

Partnering with nearby schools, youth organizations, and community centers, they facilitate the exchange of stories and wisdom between residents and the younger generation. These interactions serve as a vital bridge, allowing youth to gain valuable insights from the diverse experiences of older adults. This initiative cultivates empathy and understanding and also guarantees the transfer of invaluable wisdom from one generation to the next. Through these connections, old age homes become a nexus for the exchange of knowledge and the preservation of intergenerational bonds.
